e had another successful year at the fair. We had a lot of help from area people as well as the F.F.A, alumni and the Pella fire and EMS. The profits are shared among these groups. We support the small and large animal auctions, send kids to various youth activities. In the past we built a greenhouse at the high school. This year we gave \$1000.00 toward the new horse barn to be built at the fairgrounds, that came from tip money. We did 4000 burgers, 39 Nesco's of chili, and a lot of grilled cheese. Is it worth it? A lot of long-time fair people still gather to visit with their neighbors and friends and for many rural people the fair is their vacation time.

Inflation has hurt the town in the amount of road work we can do. Things like salaries, ambulance subsidies, tipping fees at the landfill have increased double digit. The cost of diesel fuel and gas affect almost everything we do. Some how we need to be able to keep our highway budget up so that we don't keep falling behind on road maintenance.

We will be replacing a fire truck in 23-24, the cost is expected to be \$700,000.00 divided among the five members of our fire group. The truck we bought in 2000 will be replaced in the next cycle five or six years from now.

Dick and Sally have done a good job keeping our parks and roadways in good shape. We will probably make one more cut since the weeds on the shoulders seem to really grow good this year.

Be careful during harvest season especially equipment making left turns off the roadways. There have been quite a few bears roaming the area, some quite large. So, we need to be on the lookout especially at night when driving.

CLERK'S MESSAGE by Kristine Vomastic

t is hard to believe it is time to start fall clean up already. Putting things away and reflecting on the fun summer days with grandkids and family makes me realize how fast time goes by.

I have been the Town Clerk for 15 years now. After completing the Leadership Shawano County Class I heard that our previous Clerk was not going to run for another term. At that time, we had to attend the caucus in January and be nominated to get on the ballot. I made it through that first step. I started thinking about how I could get my name out to people in Belle Plaine before the spring election. I did not know a lot of people back then and felt I should do some campaigning. One Saturday after leaving the dump I thought; "this is where I should come to meet people!" Back at that time, the dump was one of the biggest social activities on Saturday's and the best place to see a lot of people. I decided if I would make some chocolate chip cookies and take them to Bear, would he say it is ok for me to me stand by the exit gate and talk to people as they left the dump? I was hoping he would say yes. The dump was Bears domain, everyone knew him and talked to

him. He knew so much about what was going on in

the town and had the respect of a lot of town residents. He was fine with my campaign efforts and was really happy with getting cookies. I can still picture him leaning over the dumpster talking to people and enjoying the cookies. I had enough votes from that election to become Clerk. Outgoing Clerk Harriet McCaughly gave me the key to the town office and said" here are the keys to the town, do you have any questions? "I did not even know what to ask or where to start.

Fast forward fifteen years to today. Times have really changed since then and the amount of work has increased dramatically. Over twentyfive-time sensitive reports or surveys are due each year, some are on a quarterly basis. Elections have become very intense. We use the Wisvote computer system where all the information for each election is entered and stored. It starts from the time absentee ballots are sent out and recorded when they are returned. Poll books must be reconciled and every person that voted is entered into the system for each election. The biggest thing is it must match with what our election workers recorded from our machines on election night. There is a considerable amount of training required for the election workers due to laws changing frequently. Our town is truly fortunate to have the great election team that we have.

The Clerk is the secretary for the town with many other responsibilities. Sending out monthly invoices, cutting the checks for our bills each month, minutes and agendas for monthly meetings, cleaning the town hall, taking care of scheduling for the hall and shelter, issuing liquor licenses and permits, website maintenance and town newsletters are just some of the other things I do. It is extremely rewarding, and most people are very appreciative. Thank you to them.

Just a reminder the November 8, 2022, election is fast approaching, the election runs from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm. I hope to see all of you that day. Take care and have a great autumn!

TOPICS FROM THE TREASURER by Colleen Weishoff

t is hard to believe that a year has gone by already! Last September I took over the vacant treasurer position and dove headfirst into my first tax season. I learned so much that first year and am certain there is much more to come. I am looking forward to it.

ESTIMATED TIMELINES FOR 2022 REAL ESTATE/PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES

Mid October 2022 – lottery changes for the 2022 real estate taxes need to be turned in to the Shawano County Treasurer's office. This includes any new lottery credits that may be claimed for the 2022 tax year. To claim you must be the property owner as of 1/1/2022 and the property must be your primary residence. You can only have one primary residence. You cannot claim the lottery credit on business property, rental units, land, garages, or other properties that are not your primary residence. You must be a Wisconsin resident to claim this credit.

If you are no longer entitled to the lottery credit you must complete a Wisconsin Lottery and Gaming Credit Removal Request Form.

Any questions on the Lottery and Gaming Credits should be directed to the County Treasurer's office or the Wisconsin Department of Revenue at (608)-266-9457, (608)-266-0772 or via email at Igs@wisconsin.gov.

Mid to Late November 2022 – all pertinent tax information will be updated by the town (levy amounts & special assessments). The county will then process a first run of the taxes. We will verify the tax information on the first run, submit any necessary changes and once complete will approve for printing of the final tax bills.

Early December 2022 – Tax statements will be printed, stuffed, and mailed to all property owners. We will once again include the tax collection letter with town and county information, garbage collection calendar and dog license forms. Please read the tax collection letter closely. The letter provides important information regarding payment of taxes. For the past couple of years, we have not had in-person tax payment collection at the town hall. I am currently planning to have a couple of in person tax collection sessions at the town hall this year. Please refer to the tax collection letter for confirmation of in-person tax collection and the dates/ times in-person collection will take place.

Mid December 2022 - End of January 2023 - tax collections accepted for full tax payment amounts or first half installment payments by the town treasurer. Tax payments after January will need to be paid to the Shawano County Treasurer's office. All tax payments collected must be made by check. We do not accept cash payment for real estate or personal property taxes. If you wish to receive a tax payment receipt, you must provide a self-addressed stamped envelope for the receipt.

DOG LICENSES

We will be picking up new 2023 dog licenses tags in early December 2022. All dogs in the Town of Belle Plaine must be licensed and have **proof of vaccination**.

174.05(1)(1) Requirement. Except as provided in s. 174.054, the owner of a dog more than 5 months of age on January 1 of any year, or 5 months of age within the license year, shall annually, or on or before the date the dog becomes 5 months of age, pay the dog license tax, and obtain a license.

Dog licenses must be purchased prior to April 1, 2023, or they will be considered delinquent, and a late fee will be charged after that date. Remember to write out a separate check for dog licenses. Do not combine with real estate or personal property tax payment amounts.

Pumpkin Layered Magic bake (a Betty Crocker recipe)

CAKE LAYER

1 box Super Moist yellow cake mix 1 cup water 1/2 cup vegetable oil 3 eggs **PUMPKIN LAYER** 1 (15oz) can pumpkin 1 cup packed brown sugar 1 cup half-and-half 3 eggs 2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice 1/2 tsp. salt TOPPING 1 (8 oz) package cream cheese 3/4 cup powdered sugar 1 tsp. vanilla 1/8 tsp. salt 2 cups heavy whipping cream Pumpkin pie spice

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Spray bottom only of 13 x 9-inch pan with cooking spray.

In a large bowl, beat Cake Layer ingredients with electric mixer on low speed until moistened. Scrape bowl, beat 2 additional minutes on medium speed. Spread into pan.


In a separate large bowl, mix Pumpkin Layer ingredients with whisk until smooth. Carefully spoon pumpkin mixture over cake batter in pan.

Bake 48 – 53 minutes or until cake is set when touched lightly in center. Cool 30 minutes. Refrigerate at least 4 hours to chill.

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese, powdered sugar, vanilla and 1/8 t. salt until smooth. Add whipping cream, beat until smooth and stiff peaks form. Spread over chilled cake. Sprinkle lightly with pumpkin pie spice. Store covered in refrigerator.
